In 2018, CASW released a position statement strongly condemning all forms of conversion therapy, which can take many forms, but can be broadly defined as any therapy with the goal of changing or converting an individual's sexual orientation or gender identity, regardless of age. Conversion therapy is not evidence based, widely discredited, and causes great harm.

It's important to note that in *Decriminalization, Exit Strategies, and the Social Determinants of Health* linked above, CASW proposes decriminalizing consensual adult sex work: CASW vehemently condemns practices involving minors or trafficked persons. That said, while this paper is specifically on the topic of sex work, the recommendations proposed are also meant to address the issues of human trafficking, involuntary sex work, and any other forms of coercion. The same policies that will create more safety, health, and dignity for sex workers will also help create the kind of society in which people are robustly supported – a society in which minors and adults are better protected from trafficking, coercion, and survival sex work.
