



## The Association of Black Social Workers and the Canadian Association of Social Workers Joint Statement Against Islamophobia: Sorrow and Solidarity

The Association of Black Social Workers (ABSW) and the Canadian Association of Social Workers (CASW) stand in solidarity with Muslim individuals, families, and communities against Islamophobia – and against the broader societal and political forces that incite and embolden it.

Our associations are horrified by the most recent targeted attack on 5 members of the Muslim community in London, Ontario and offer our deepest condolences to those impacted by this tragedy. We vehemently condemn not only this act of terror, but the Islamophobia – both blatant and covert – that underpinned this hateful act, and too many others.

As the horrific 2017 Quebec Mosque attack is still painfully fresh, this latest violence comes as part of a deeply troubling line of similar acts in our country.

While some may assign individual blame, the reality is that racism, prejudice, and white supremacy are deeply embedded in our society and in our politics: this was evident in 2015's proposed 'barbaric cultural practices' hotline and the *Zero Tolerance for Barbaric Cultural Practices Act*, and it can be seen in small, everyday interactions that quietly kindle hate. We must remain vigilant against hatred however, and wherever, it appears.

Ours is the only profession that embeds the pursuit of social justice within everyday practice, with social workers at the forefront of many movements for human rights and against hatred throughout history.

ABSW and CASW remain committed to allyship, and to continuing the critical work of dismantling racism, hatred, and prejudice in all its forms, and echo calls from the Muslim community for justice and action.
